Our parish Faith Formation Process recognizes that parents are the primary catechists of their children. Our job is to assist them in helping create a culture of faith in their homes, in their lives. That's where all of you, the parish of St. Francis de Sales comes in!

Four pillars of our faith, WORD, WORSHIP, COM-MUNITY AND SERVICE are our primary touchstones for our new vision. Each month

students along with their families will concentrate on one core theme from our life of faith and explore that theme through lessons with their catechist and parents (WORD), through our rituals and Sunday WORSHIP together, through gathering with the larger parish COM-MUNITY to explore a certain aspect of that theme, and in working in SERVICE to our parish and neighborhood each month, under the guidance of the adults in their lives.

What are we asking of parents?

Parents will actively be involved in weekly Sunday Mass, in at home lessons, and in group sessions with their children twice a month.

What are we asking of parishioners?

We are asking you to welcome our families at Sunday worship. Be your best selves. Talk to one another. Praise their parent-



ing, love their children.

We want you to participate in our intergenerational Sundays...come talk about your favorite saint or favorite way to pray. Come help us make and serve pancakes. Come share with us why your faith is important to you, or how your job helps you serve others. Join with us as we create gift bags for our elderly or homeless neighbors. Give us ideas on how we can better serve our community. Pray for us and pray with us!

So, this is our St. Francis de Sales GOOD NEWS!

Now, go out and tell someone else our good news and come back ready to celebrate with us next Sunday! Amen?

# "Why me, Lord?"

I've prayed this little prayer many times. "Why do I get asked to do things?" "Why me?"

After some reflection, the answer came. Someone sees in me a certain gift, talent, quality that is needed at the time, and then they give me the nudge to put it to use. When I was a teenager, mom would always call me when she needed something heavy lifted. When I was in the seventh grade I was asked to receive the key to the school from an outgoing eighth grader - Sister noticed some public speaking ability in me. When I was a Freshman in high school I discovered that I could sing - the choral director invited me to join the Glee Club.

As I moved on in life I began to recognize gifts, talents, and qualities in myself, so I began volunteering when I realized I had what it took to do the task. When I was in high school I made

Now I'd like to talk about you. What gifts and talents do you have? Do you think you have any that might be useful in serving our parish community? This ministry has helped me get to know so many other wonderful parishioners and has connected me to other meaningful ministries, like the Social Justice Ministry. Diving into ministry within my first few weeks at the parish helped me to feel at home here.

And more thoughts on lectoring from Marissa Bailey, who was initiated into our faith a few years ago:

I chose to be a lector as a vocation as my way of sharing my "talent". We are asked to share our tal-

Kristin believes that humans have a basic desire to make connections with one another, and when we reach out to others we nourish our own spirit.

Kristin is especially attracted to St. Francis de Sales because here her soul and her intellect are nourished. The community here feeds her in so many ways, not the least of which is in piquing her curiosity about life and other people. She finds a richness in the homilies and appreciates the multicultural vibrancy, describ-

ing our parish as a 'magnet for the most interesting people from all walks of life'!

This is all well and good for an extrovert ...but what about me? I'm shy, I'm an introvert, I can't possibly talk to someone I don't know.

Kristin suggests starting slowly and offers tips for moving a little bit outside your comfort zone:

- First, assume you will get a positive response!
- Make eye contact and smile with your eyes, too.
- Start with a general compliment: Oh what a great scarf, piece of jewelry, hat or t-shirt, etc. See where the conversation goes.

The truth is most people appreciate the chance to share a little about themselves, they just need the encouragement to start. (So... where do you live? Where are you from?) This opens doors to widen the circle of welcomers by introducing them after Mass to a parishioner you know has a similar background. And since SFDS is so international there is often an on-the-spot match.

We often use a table as a metaphor for our parish at whose table Jesus invites us all to feast.

Think of your role as being one of those 'leaves' we put in a table to make it bigger. For example, at a holiday dinner when you need to extend the table so everyone has a seat?

That is who we are .... leaves in the table of the Lord, making sure there's a place for all at the table.

#### Why YOU should join the choir

FAQs that can help your decision-making process if the flow chart wasn't sufficient to guide your decision making.

### 1. Why would I want to join the choir?

Joining the choir is an opportunity to immerse yourself in the mass and deepen your faith. If you haven't sung before, there is truly something special about the emotions that are embedded in the music we sing at mass. I find that the music at mass connects me to the joy, the longing, and the hope that is embedded in the mass (and our faith!).

In addition, singing in the choir is example of putting your faith into action. Doing something brave that helps bring people closer to Chris, what better way to answer your baptismal call than that?

#### 2. I've never sung in a choir before, it sounds really scary

Singing in the choir can be scary but that's before you meet the wonderful community the choir has created. We all support each other no matter what and it doesn't hurt that John (the supremely talented pianist) is an excellent teacher.

# 3. Isn't awkward being at the front of the church during mass?

You'll find that the congregation usually looks at the priest! In addition,

# 4. What are rehearsal obligations?

During the summer, we only meet a half hour before mass (10:30 for English, 12:00 for Spanish). In the fall, we have rehearsals on Monday nights. Not everyone makes it to every rehearsal because life often gets in the way, but we do the best we can and together we create the music you hear every Sunday.
